The deceased was born in Fairfax, Vt., in the year 1819. His father Johnathan George, moved to this county in the year 1840. Five years ago Mr. George had a severe run of pneumonia which so impaired his health that he was obliged to retire from business. For the last three years he has resided in this village. He leaves a wife and an only daughter, Mrs. Minnie Dawson, to mourn his loss. They have the deep sympathy of all in their great affliction. Mr. and Mrs. George have lived together for forty-eight years, and we seldom see a couple whose domestic relations have been happier or more pleasant. Mr. George was converted when a young man, and in all the relations of life, was a conscientious Christian man, endeavoring to do good to his neighbors and town. He will be missed by all who knew him. Another one of the old landmarks has been removed.
